



Fifth Sunday of Lent / B

"We would like to see Jesus"

People often looked for some 'sign' from Jesus, usually a miracle of healing that would impress them and the Greeks mentioned in today's Gospel were no different. They were probably visitors to Israel, pilgrims come to take part in the great Festival of the Passover in Jerusalem, Jesus gave them however a very strange 'sign' to consider in response to their request to see him.

First he says that 'the hour' has come when everyone would see him glorified. He then goes on to describe this 'hour'. He could have spoken about it as being an experience of glory as when he was transfigured and spoke to Moses and Elijah. Instead he spoke of it as an experience of death using an image that he had often used in his parables, a grain of wheat. This image is ultimately about the new life that would come from that grain of wheat but for this to happen, the grain has to 'die' first.

John doesn't have an account of Jesus' agony in the garden of Gethsemene as part of his Passion story. Instead, all the pain and anguish of that moment are there in Jesus words, "Now my soul is troubled. What shall I say: Father save me from this hour?" In the humanity that he shares with us, Jesus is naturally anxious and troubled by what he has to go through so that this new life will emerge.

Like us, when we are confronted by a potentially painful experience that seems to be beyond our capacity to manage, Jesus would prefer to be saved from this experience. He realises however that he cannot because his whole life has been leading up to this moment, this 'hour' when everyone will see who he really is. He must go through it so that God may be seen in him, that God may be "glorified" through Jesus life. This 'glory' is God's love for us through Jesus because "God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son."

In the story of St Patrick, whose feast day we celebrated last Wednesday, we have a very dramatic example of the way in which new life can emerge through the way in which we come through our own experience of suffering and loss. Patrick was born into an influential and devout Christian family but, as he put it in the summing up of his life that he himself wrote, he was a thoughtless young man "who neglected the worship of the true God."

All this changed when he was captured by Irish raiders and sold as a slave in Ireland. There, far from his family and the civilised world that he knew, he lived as a slave for six years. But God spoke to Patrick through this experience and Patrick listened:

Before I had to suffer, I was like a stone lying in the deep mud. Then he who is mighty came and in his mercy he not only pulled me out but lifted me uphe inspired me with fear, reverence and patience to be the one who would if possible serve the people faithfully to whom the love of Christ brought me. (Confessions 12-13)

Patrick managed to escape but, several years later, made the painful decision to leave his family and his society and return to the people who had enslaved him. He would share with them the new life in Christ that he had himself found as a slave among them. His is a story of a conversion that would go on to convert others and it all came about through the way in which he could see God through his own setbacks and suffering. His story shares in the great story of Jesus: "When I am lifted up from the earth, I shall draw all to myself." It is also the story of "the grain that dies and yields a rich harvest." It is what Jesus challenges us to consider whenever we encounter failures, setbacks and suffering in our own lives.
