

Mary visits her relative Elizabeth; they are both pregnant. Mary is pregnant with Jesus and Elizabeth is pregnant with John Baptist.



The Most Holy TRINITY / B 30 May 2021

### "Know that I am with you always; yes, to the end of time"



The mystery of the Holy Trinity that we celebrate this Sunday is not a concept or an idea about God but the story of a relationship, a relationship that includes us and all of creation. It is a mystery, not because it is 'an insoluble problem' but because there is no limit to the depth of its

It is the story of a relationship within God of three Persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit that is revealed to us through both the Old and New Testaments, especially through Jesus. It is also a relationship within God that involves us at every level of our existence. One of the most profound depictions of the depth and complexity of these interconnected relationships is to be found in this famous icon by the fifteenth century Russian monk and artist Andrei Rublev.

An icon, (from the Greek word for 'image'), is a religious painting in the Byzantine tradition that invites us to enter into the world of God and his saints through the images that are

depicted. This is done through the images chosen, the colours that are used and the relationship of the figures within the icon to each other and to us. Its purpose is to draw us to God and his saints through prayer and meditation. An icon painter goes through a time of fasting and prayer before beginning the painting.

This icon contains three interconnected stories. The first is from Genesis 18:1-16: the story of the three angelic visitors, the three 'men', welcomed by Abraham and Sarah and invited to share a meal with them. After the meal, they told Abraham that his wife would have a son the following year - Isaac, the son that God had promised him. The story begins with, "the Lord appeared to Abraham... as he sat at the entrance to his tent."

The second story is shown through the way in which each of the 'angelic visitors' are depicted in the icon, especially their relationship to each other. All three are wearing a blue garment, the colour indicating divinity. Other images in this icon emphasise the unity and distinctive nature of each of these 'angels'. The one on the left is the Father. Most of his body is covered in a light veil: this is the 'hidden' God of the Old Testament. Behind him is a house reminding us both of Abraham's hospitality and Jesus' promise to us "There are many rooms in my Father's house" (Jn 14:2). The central figure is the Son. His reddish brown garment is the colour of the earth and represents his humanity. Behind him is a tree, representing both the Tree of Life (Jesus is the new Adam) and the wood of the cross. The figure on the right is the Holy Spirit. The pale green of his cloak signifies his role as "the giver of life", the Spirit who "will renew the face of the earth" through Baptism.

The way in which the faces of each of these 'angels' are inclined towards each other shows their relationship. The Son and Holy Spirit both look at the Father who also looks at them. They form a circle around a table (altar) on which there is a cup that all three are looking at. This is the cup that Jesus knew he had to drink in the Garden of Gethsemane. It is also the cup of the Eucharist, "the blood of the covenant, poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins" (Mt 26:27).

There is a space in front of this cup for another 'person' to complete the circle created by the unity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This is the space for the third story, our story, we who have been created in the image of God and, through the Holy Spirit, called to follow the way of Jesus in our lives. Through the Eucharist we receive Jesus into our lives, take part in his work, the work of the Holy Spirit "renewing the face of the earth" and are welcomed, like the prodigal son, into our Father's house.
