13th Sunday in Ordinary Time / B 27 June 2021

"Do not be afraid; only have faith"

Last week's Gospel story of Jesus calming a storm ended with a question: "Who is this that even the wind and sea obey him?" This is then followed by three stories where Mark puts before us an answer to this question - the healing of a (non Jewish) man possessed by evil spirits and then the two interconnected stories that provide this week's gospel. This is the 'good news' that we all need to hear and to take into our lives.

There are a lot of details in each of these two stories of the woman healed and the young girl raised to life, details that reflect the nature of the 'illness' Jesus came to heal. Again, as with the calming of the storm, we see Jesus 'teaching' by the way he acted. Jairus, a synagogue official, throws himself down at Jesus' feet shortly after he had arrived at one of the towns along the Sea of Galilee. This would have been an uncharacteristic and undignified thing for him to do. In his position, a wandering teacher such as Jesus accompanied by his followers would have meant trouble. But he was desperate. Before anything else, he was a father and his daughter was dying.

Soon after, while Jesus was on his way to Jairus' house, a woman who had been suffering from uncontrollable bleeding for twelve years came up to Jesus through the crowd. She too was desperate. No doctor had been able to cure her. She was not only getting weaker and weaker but, in a society that considered an ability to bear children as a curse, she could never have children. She was also, because of her condition, 'impure' in everyday Jewish life, forbidden to take part in social and religious activities, just as lepers were.

Both however, in their different ways, demonstrated a faith in Jesus that neither the disciples in the storm nor the people who laughed at him when he said "The child is not dead but asleep", were able to show. This faith in Jesus hadn't been easy for them. Jairus risked looking like a fool before the people in the town who would have looked up to him. The woman had to overcome a deep sense of personal shame just to be able to go up to Jesus and touch the hem of his cloak. Jesus' words to Jairus apply equally to both of them, "Do not be afraid; only have faith."

This faith was based on a sense of trust in Jesus - who he is and how he appeared to them. We know how their stories ended but of course they didn't. To act as they did required both a profound trust in Jesus and a great deal of courage. They had to deal with all doubts, questions and barriers raised by their culture, their religious assumptions, their social position, even their gender. An important part of the 'good news' of this gospel is that faith in Christ can free us. We are not imprisoned forever by the limitations our life and our society has imposed on us. As our reading from the Old Testament book of Wisdom reminds us, "To be, for this God created all. The world's created things have health in them; in them no fatal poison can be found."

Jairus' daughter and the woman were restored to full health, to life, in fact, whether literally so by being raised from the dead or by being raised from social, cultural and religious 'death'. "Who can this be", that can give us life when we are dead? The life that Jesus can give us through our faith in him makes us "imperishable", in the way that our reading from Wisdom describes God's intention for our life. Faith, our relationship with God through Jesus, enables us to overcome the disabilities and limitations of our life so that we can become what God has created us to be -"made in the image of his own nature."
