Safeguarding Sunday, 12 September 2021

This week the Catholic Archdiocese of Sydney celebrated National Child Protection Week for the fifth year in a row. and today, the week culminates with the celebration of Safeguarding Sunday. The celebration of this past week, leading up to Safeguarding Sunday, has provided us with an opportunity to reflect on how we can improve the ways we care for, protect and listen to the Children and Young People in our communities.

To help us reflect, the Safeguarding Office has developed two new resources; the Children's Activity Book and A Guide for Young People to Better Understand their Wellbeing.

Additionally, the Safeguarding Offices of the Archdiocese of Sydney, the Diocese of Parramatta and the Diocese of Broken Bay, have collaborated on the development of a resource. Entitled Children and Young People's Participation in Catholic Communities, this guide promotes community awareness to support, engage, listen to and communicate with Children and Young People.



St Peter Claver

Born at Verdu, Catalonia, Spain. In 1610, he landed at Cartagena (Columbia) the principal slave market of the New World, where a thousand slaves were brought every month.



After his ordination in 1616, he dedicated himself to the service of the Black slaves - a work that was to last for thirty-three years. He laboured unceasingly for the salvation of the slaves and the abolition of the slave trade. During his ministry it is estimated that he personally catechized and baptized 300,000 slaves. He would then follow up on them to ensure that as Christians they received their Christian and civil rights.

Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time / B

"He has done all things well.."



Even though it has been many years since I've been there, I will never forget the impression this image of Christ, 'Ruler of All' (Christos Pantocrator), made on me as I entered the huge twelfth century cathedral at Cefalu in Sicily. Christ looks directly at you. Everything about this image, its position, its size, its strong colours, all come together to tell you that here is someone who fills your whole life, someone who cannot be ignored.

This is Christ as he is presented in today's Gospel, someone who inspired the pagan people living near the Sea of Galilee with "unbounded admiration." Mark presents Jesus' healing miracle within the context of our first reading from the prophet Isaiah. The healing of the deaf man with a speech impediment is more than an extraordinary act performed by Jesus but a sign that God has come to save us. When God comes, Isaiah says, "the eyes of the blind shall be opened; the ears of the deaf unsealed." The universal nature of Jesus' mission is highlighted by the miracle occurring among a pagan people not in Israel. He is truly 'Ruler of All'.

God's coming will, Isaiah says, give us courage. It certainly did for the man Jesus healed as well as for those who witnessed it. Put yourself in his position: a lifetime of being unable to fully understand what was happening around you, unable to express your thoughts and needs except by sounds that would have made you seem to be less than human to those around you. Imagine a life full of unspoken frustration, anger and humiliation.

But then Jesus comes and, with a few words, completely transforms your life. He does this however in a way that respects you. He takes you aside "in private, away from the crowds" and then, through personal physical contact, touches the source of all your problems. In the same spirit, he sighs as he looks up to heaven and says, "Be opened" - a personal expression of distress, perhaps, "at the sight of someone who, in the thinking of his time, was bound by the power of Satan." Jesus has shown his divinity, his power over suffering and evil in all its forms, through his humanity.

Mark wants us to understand this particular miracle as the 'good news' of Christ's power to heal us in our own experience of being unable to hear God or to respond to him. God speaks to us through all that we do and experience each day but, like the man in the Gospel story, we are unable to hear him and respond. Continuing with the Gospel image, our situation can be compared to that of many people as they grow older and are unable to hear people who speak at a lower sound pitch or take part in conversations where a number of people are speaking. As a result they often miss what is being said and become more withdrawn.

Here we can learn from the way Christ healed the man in our Gospel story. There are so many voices that we hear each day from our society as well as from within us. It is easy to become 'deaf' to God speaking to us each day since God often speaks to us quietly in our lives. Jesus took the man "away from the crowds." Our relationship with Christ is formed when we make a conscious effort to be with him, something perhaps that this period of lockdown should provide us with plenty of opportunities. We can't speak with any conviction about God or our faith if, for example, we have never sat with a passage of scripture and put to ourselves, this very simple question - what is it saying to me? Through this relationship with Christ, we learn to identify God's voice among the many discordant voices we hear each day. This in turn gives us the courage to 'speak clearly', even to "sing for joy" because God has come into our lives to save us.
