

St Simon

The second "Simon" among the Twelve, otherwise called Simon "the Zealot" or "the Canaanean." He was from Cana of Galilee.

St Simon was surnamed the Zealot for his rigid adherence to the Jewish law and to the Canaanite law. He was one of the original followers of Christ. The most widespread tradition is that after evangelizing in Egypt, Simon joined Jude in Persia and Armenia or Beirut, Lebanon, where both were martyred in 65AD.

St Jude Thaddeus

One of the twelve apostles, Jude is identified in the Gospels as the brother of James (Gospel of Luke) or the brother of Jesus (Gospel of Mark). He is considered to be the writer of the Letter of Jude. The brief letter deals sharply with the problem of false teachers in the church, which is similar in content to 2 Peter.

According to tradition he preached in Mesopotamia and Persia.

"What do you want me to do for you?"

A few weeks ago we heard the story of the rich man who ran up to Jesus and, with great earnestness and sincerity, asked him, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" The answer Jesus had given him wasn't one that he had expected, so, in the end, "he went away sad for he had many possessions." He couldn't, as it were, 'see past' all the things that had given him comfort and security. Even though he had addressed Jesus as "Good master," he was unable to trust Jesus enough to follow him on the way of life he had opened up for him.

By contrast, Bartimaeus is presented as "throwing off his cloak, jumping up and going to Jesus". For a blind beggar like him, this cloak would have been his most treasured possession. During the day, he would spread it out to sit on and to collect coins; at night, it would have been his blanket or even his bed. Mark lists each of his actions, "throwing off...jumping up...going up to Jesus" as images of conversion. As Jesus himself recognised, each one of these actions required a great deal of confident faith in him. "Like the nets that Peter must let go of, Bartimaeus leaves behind some of his past in order to see his future." (Jesus: a pilgrimage)

Bartimaeus of course wanted to be healed of his blindness and this desire was so strong that it gave him the courage to ignore the voices of all those who, for reasons of their own, wanted him to keep quiet. In his reflection on this scene, Fr James Martin comments:

We sometimes need to ignore the crowd, especially when they tell us to shut up. 'Don't desire something better for yourself', they say to Bartimaeus, and to us. 'Give up these ridiculous hopes of change. Stop hoping for something new!' By contrast, Jesus doesn't shout 'Be quiet!' His voice is different than the crowds'. Gently, he asks, 'What can I do for you?' (Jesus: a pilgrimage)

We have become used to the Paralympic Games as being a key part of the Olympic Games, something that would have been unthinkable in the past. Then, few people would have thought about what people with a disability could actually do. They could see only what they couldn't do because of their disability. Similarly, what Jesus saw in Bartimaeus was something that the people around him couldn't see, his insight into who Jesus is and the extraordinary faith he showed when he repeatedly called out to Jesus, "Son of David, have pity on me!"

Bartimaeus could 'see' what the people around him, who kept telling him to keep quiet, couldn't see. This Jesus that he had heard about but couldn't see was someone he knew he could trust in to heal him. It was his persistent faith that, in the end, not only brought him healing and inspired him to follow Jesus "along the road" but also managed to change the attitudes of those around him.

What do we 'see' when we look at ourselves, the society that we live in and the Church that we are part of? Do we see only our failures, all the things that we are unable to do, our sinfulness in so many ways? Or do we see the possibilities that Jesus will open up for us if we trust in who he is and, like Bartimaeus, say to him "Let me see again"? When we lose the main focus of our lives and become 'blind' to God's presence in our world, we are tempted to lose hope and to hear only the voices that confirm the powerlessness that we already feel. "What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus asks us. He alone can fully respond to the hope of healing each of us has and guide us out of the darkness that we can so easily find ourselves in.
